STUDENT UNIFORMS

POLICY:

Policy for Shipping Care Packages to Escuela Caribe

According to school policies, care packages are to be shoebox size and may be sent every three months, beginning with one package at the time of entry, if so desired. You have three options:

- First, we recommend your asking parents coming for visits to carry items down.
- A second option is to send your packages through a shipping service in Florida. In order to do so, you must follow the instructions as outlined below.
- As a last resort, you may send your care packages to Marion for our office to send down as possible.

For the second option, the cost for shipping from Lake Worth to the Dominican Republic is \$1.00 per pound with a two-pound minimum. The following is the process of using option 2 above.

- 1. Determine the weight of the box and multiply by \$1.00/pound.
- 2. Enclose a check or money order in the amount determined. Make the check out to Escuela Caribe and put it in an envelope marked "To Jeff Seabrooke" <u>inside</u> the box, taped to a side, <u>not</u> the bottom.
- 3. The box will come to Escuela Caribe. Your shipping payment will pay for shipping from Lake Worth to us.

Please re-read the above instructions, as they are very important. Do not send the care package in your child's name, nor in "Jeff Seabrooke's" name, but to the school as is shown:

Enclose in the payment envelope a packing list naming your child and what you have sent. Feel free to mark each item with your child's name or include a note with the items in the box identifying them as being your child's.

Please work with us on this so that we can get the care packages to your child quickly and efficiently. It must be done as described above, or it will become a large problem for us. We want to avoid having to bill you for shipping charges of care packages. You may expect the shipping service to take approximately 3 weeks from the date that you mailed it to reach CVS.

Entrance Requirements for the Dominican Republic

In order to enter the Dominican Republic, a person must show proof of citizenship. Generally, presenting a passport accomplishes this. The Dominican Republic will, however, accept a birth certificate <u>and</u> a valid, state-authorized photo I.D., such as a driver's license or Identification Card. With this proof you will be able to purchase a tourist card, which allows you to enter the Dominican Republic.

Your son/daughter will be able to enter the Dominican Republic with a tourist card. This card will be purchased once they arrive in the Dominican Republic or from the airline. An educational visa will not be necessary for this initial entry. We will do the required documentation for the student.

It is best to apply for a passport. This can usually be done at your local post office. This requires two photos. It is necessary for your son/daughter to have his/her passport in hand to enter the Dominican Republic. You will need a birth certificate with a raised seal when you apply for a passport and one to show proof of citizenship allowing you to purchase a tourist card en route to the Dominican Republic. Obtain two extra 2 X 2 passport-type photos, which will be submitted with a visa application.

Remember, if your child is not arriving with a passport, we will need <u>two</u> birth certificates. One will be used for entry and the other will be submitted with a passport application.

WHEN TO COME

When you begin to plan to visit your son or daughter, please clear these dates with Cindy Hundley (cvs@nhym.org or 809-574-2760, ext. 236) before purchasing the tickets. Every attempt is made to arrange parent visits so they do not conflict with planned activities (i.e., house trips, spiritual retreats, etc.). We will arrange for you to call your student two weeks prior to your arrival. Please do not discuss the visit with them until that time. American and Continental are the main carriers. Parents may visit according to the policies outlined in this guide.

TRAVELING TO A FOREIGN COUNTRY

When traveling to a foreign country, it is best to have a passport. The Dominican Republic will, however, accept a birth certificate and a valid, state-authorized, photo ID as sufficient identification (The DR will not accept a driver's license as proof of citizenship; you need a passport or birth certificate, a copy will not be accepted).

ARRIVAL

We recommend you fly into Santiago (STI), which is the closest international airport (only 45 minutes from our campus). Other international airports include Puerto Plata (2 hours away) and Santo Domingo (three hours away); we do not recommend Punta Cana as it is five hours away. Flights from the United States arrive in the early morning or early evening. You will need to purchase a tourist card, as soon as you enter the terminal building. The cost is \$10 US. Keep this card with you for your departure, as you will not be permitted to leave the country without it. The following are some of the terms you will need to know in order to fill out your tourist card.

After filling out the tourist card, you will go through immigration where your passport or birth certificate with photo ID and tourist card will be checked. Depending upon the

number of people on your flight, this could take between five and thirty minutes. Be sure that all of your documents are returned to you and that you have your tourist card (yellow or green paper) before you go into the baggage claim area.

BAGGAGE CLAIM AND INSPECTION

From immigration, proceed to the baggage claim area. If you should happen to not collect all of your luggage, be sure to fill out a lost baggage claim immediately. It is wise to carry your valuables, cameras, etc., and a change of clothes in your carry-on bag. Carry all currency and travelers checks on your person.

Proceed to where the luggage is inspected (i.e., customs/aduana). If asked, open your luggage, packages, purses and bags. Everything may be checked, so be sure to keep your eye on the inspectors because they may try to take something for themselves. If they ask for money, do not give it to them unless they determine that an item will be charged a customs fee and forms are filled out. Instead ask them in English, "Why?" and they will let you pass eventually.

If a porter carries your luggage outside, pay him either \$1.00 US per bag or the Dominican peso equivalent. Pay only this, even if he helped you through customs. More than likely, he will take what you offer him.

CURRENCY AND RATES OF EXCHANGE

Once you land in the Dominican Republic, all prices are in pesos (except for the tourist card). You will need to exchange your dollars as soon as possible. The dollar is universally accepted as a medium of exchange. The exchange rate varies considerably, but it is approximately 31.00 pesos for one dollar.

You can exchange dollars at the airport or at any bank. <u>Do not change with individuals who approach you!</u> If you look carefully, you should be able to find a bank at the airport or a money exchange place. The bank may ask you to exchange money at the exchange place which looks like an information counter.

We will be happy to show you where you can exchange your money when you arrive in Jarabacoa (although we prefer you not take your Escuela Caribe child there during your stay).

TRANSPORTATION FROM THE AIRPORT

At your request, we can pre-arrange a private driver and car to meet you as soon as you leave customs. When discussing your arrangements with Escuela Caribe, please let us know if you want this. If you do not find anyone to meet you as planned, find a pay phone (If you need an operator dial "0." They usually speak English.) and call our school. The office numbers are 574-2760 or 574-2225 (ext 222 during work hours or ext 243 after hours).

AIRPORT TAXI SERVICE

Airport taxis will take you to any location on the island. If you wish, you can contract a taxi car to Jarabacoa for approximately \$600 -\$800 pesos from Santiago. You might be able to negotiate a better price. Expect some difficulty if you do not speak Spanish, but sign language and patience will help. Fares are often established and posted.

RENTAL CARS

You may consider renting a car. This gives you more freedom to see the country and the sights. You will notice many car rental agencies as you exit from customs. We do not recommend any one in particular because all are more or less equal (Budget, Avis, Hertz, National, plus other local agencies). You can expect to pay \$600-1,000 RD per day, depending upon the size of the car and the comfort you desire. Most cars available are small European and Japanese models. Some agencies rent cars with unlimited mileage. For convenience sake, it is best to make arrangements through a travel agent in the States in order for your car to be waiting upon your arrival.

If you rent a car at the airport, check over the car completely and have the company mark down any scratches, etc. At times rental agencies are known to attempt to charge you for damage you did not do. Also, check to make sure that the gas tank is full before the attendants leave.

If you are stopped by the police or military-type officials, do not attempt to communicate with them in Spanish. You are better off feigning ignorance. If you are flying into Santo Domingo you will have to pay a toll of 15 pesos in and out of Santo Domingo.

Please note that we often can arrange for a private driver to do all of your trips to and from the airport for you. This is usually a little less expensive than a car rental. When discussing your arrangements with Escuela Caribe, please let us know if you want this.

MAPS AND TRAFFIC LAWS

A map of Santo Domingo and the Dominican Republic may be obtained from the rental car companies at the airport. Other maps are provided in this material to assist you in your travel. Please be sure to bring this visitor's guide and the enclosed materials with you when you come. If you are driving, keep the following things in mind: most laws and traffic control regulations are the same as you are accustomed to; however, there are a few exceptions. If a policeman is directing traffic, you must <u>STOP</u> when he is facing you or when his back is to you. You may pass only when he turns his side to you and waves you on. Hand signals or auto signals are expected when stopping or turning. Use caution at all intersections, even when you clearly have the right-of-way. The Dominican driver pays little regard to stop signs. You will notice that drivers use their horns much more than their brakes. Wear your seat belt. It is the law and you may be arrested if you (the driver) and/or passenger do not wear it.

COST PER PERSON

Round trip airfare from Chicago is approximately \$700-1000 US per person. Hotels, rental cars, food, entertainment, etc. vary in cost and range from \$50.00-100.00 US per person per day. Please note that all prices listed in this guide are approximate and you can expect changes due to currency fluctuation, the season, and/or the demand for accommodations.

DRINKING WATER

The most common ailment suffered by Americans in the Dominican Republic is diarrhea. To lessen the possibility of getting diarrhea, tap water should be avoided, as well as raw vegetables and fruit that are not peeled. Water served at better restaurants is generally purified. You may want to have your family doctor prescribe an anti-spasmodic for you to bring along just in case. You may also ask your family doctor about antibiotics to take while here if you are particularly sensitive.

WEATHER

The temperature in Jarabacoa ranges from 75-85 degrees during the day and from 60-70 degrees at night, depending upon the time of year. La Vega, Santo Domingo, and most of the rest of the country average about 10 degrees warmer than Jarabacoa. Unless you are from the southern states, the days will feel quite warm and the evenings in Jarabacoa may be chilly to you. You will want to keep this in mind when packing. Cool, casual sportswear is quite appropriate, and a sweater or light jacket may be needed. Also, you might want to take a change or two of dress clothes for appropriate occasions, although dress for the most part is casual but modest. Walking shorts are generally acceptable in public areas.

CULTURE

The Dominican culture and environment are much different from those of the United States. Therefore, we would like to give you some information about the country in order to better prepare you.

The rolling mountains, with the lush, green vegetation from pine trees to palm trees, are truly beautiful. Many of the beaches too are very beautiful. Despite the beauty that nature provides, however, the physical conditions are not as good. Many poor people who live in shacks and whose children may not be wearing clothes inhabit the country. Horses, donkeys, and cattle may roam the business districts of towns. The aroma of garbage in street gutters may be apparent at times. A variety of bugs prosper well in the tropical climate. Spiders, cockroaches, flies, moths, mosquitoes, and chameleons are common annoyances.

Because you are an American, your presence in the country will create some attention. Although some people may be rude at times, you are usually never in danger. You will

soon grow accustomed to the stares and the "Hey, you" that you will hear. In keeping with cultural expectations, we advise that females dress modestly (no short shorts or flimsy blouses), so as not to draw more attention to themselves.

TOURIST INFORMATION

Currently, there are few U.S.-based Dominican Tourist Information Centers. If your travel agent is knowledgeable of a source for Dominican tourist information, please let us know so that we can inform other parents.

TRANSPORTATION AROUND THE JARABACOA AREA

When you are staying in the Jarabacoa area, you are responsible for your own transportation from town to the school campus. If you have not rented a car at the airport, we suggest using Jarabacoa's taxi service. Taxi service is provided from Jarabacoa to Escuela Caribe or vice versa at an established rate per trip (in the range of \$4 US each way). You may call Jaraba Taxi at 574-6464 or 574-4640. Pick up takes between 5 and 10 minutes.

FOOD AVAILABLE IN JARABACOA
